Airport Revenue – Sources & Restrictions



Airport Revenue

- Airports are required to be self-sustaining.
- Revenue generated at the airport must be used for an airport purpose.
- Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) decides what an "airport purpose" is.

Public Parking

- Significant revenue generator for many airports.
- From a congestion, trip count, and emissions standpoint, something to encourage, actually.

Employee Parking

- For airline employees, employer-provided parking is largely an expected benefit.
- Who provides the parking lot? Company, or airport authority?
- For airport authority: cost recovery, or revenue generator?
- At SEA, not enough of it.

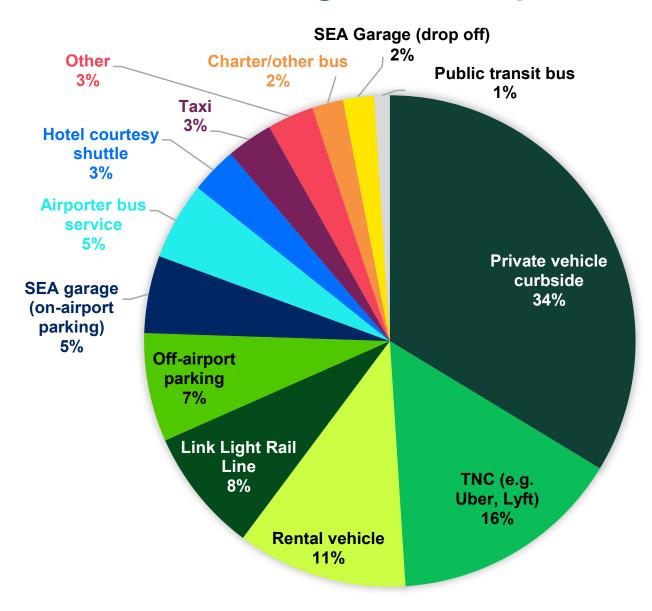

Passenger Mode Split

Motivations, Trends, and Observations:

- Passengers are very time sensitive, less costmotivated.
- Willing to pay for most convenient travel experience; a free transit ticket does not perform any meaningful mode-shift.
- Getting picked-up/dropped-off by a loved one is the mode to beat.
- Public transit struggles to serve the airport customer (limited service areas and service hours).
- Of all public transit options, light rail is the favored method (awareness, certainty).
- Biggest complaints focus on things not in the Port's control (limited service areas and hours, travel time, safety perceptions).



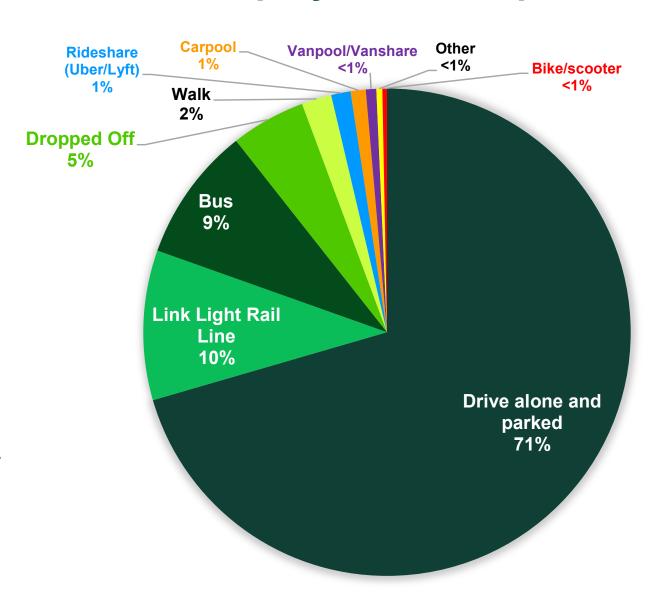


TDM and airport employees

Motivations, Trends, and Observations:

- More cost-motivated since they are commuting to SEA every day; desire reliability and predictability.
- Also time-sensitive (shift start time) but willing to take longer commute if the less costly option.
- For many employees, public transit simply is not a good option.
- Many employees receive employer-paid, fully-subsidized parking as a benefit. It is difficult for any kind of incentive to trump that benefit.
- Many other employees receive no commuter benefits.
- Getting dropped off/picked up makes sense for some.
- Given our location, scooter/bike/walk is possible for lastmile.
- Working at the airport is challenging, but can be lucrative.

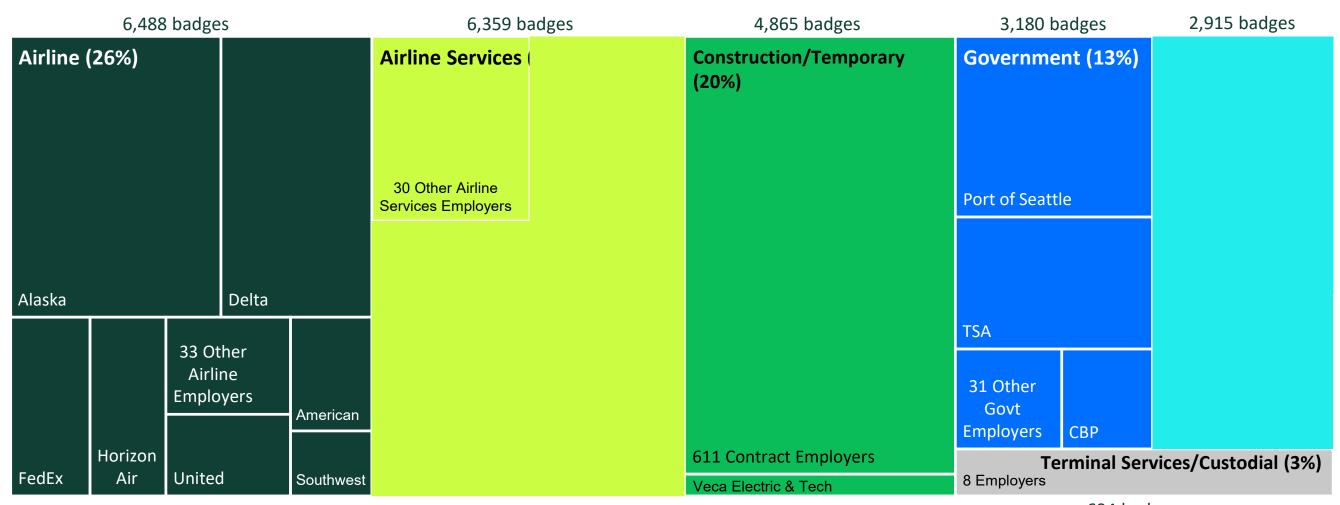






Who works at SEA? Badge distribution by employer category

Airport Employers

- There are over 800 companies represented in our badge data
- Less than 5% of them have 100+ employees.
- Together they represent around 70% of total issued badges

Over 90% of badged companies have less than 50 employees

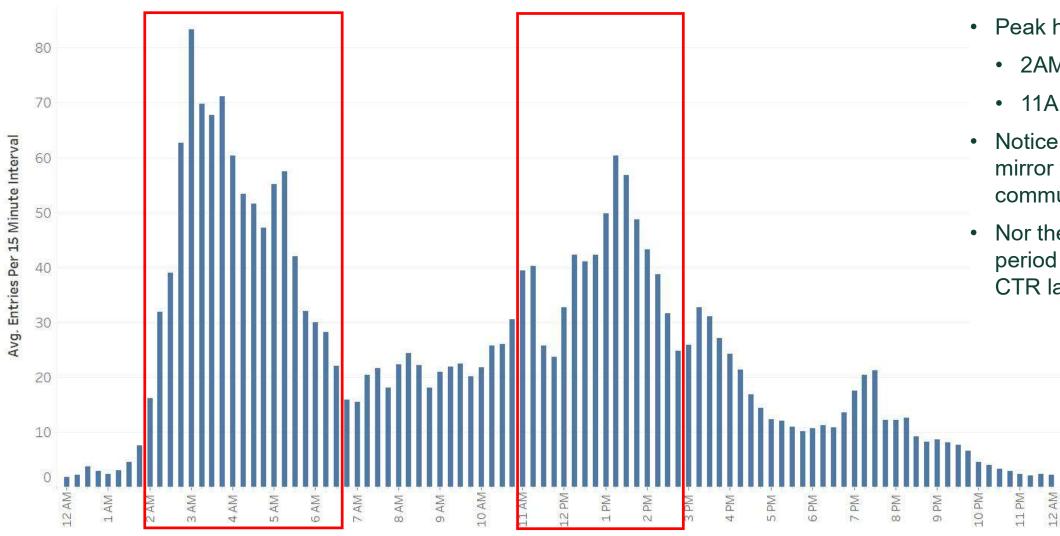






When are the commuting peak periods for the airport workforce? Tracking North Employee Parking Lot (NEPL) entries every 15 minutes





- Peak hours of entry are:
 - 2AM (!) to 7AM
 - 11AM to 3PM
- Notice how they don't mirror traditional "9-5" commuting peak periods...
- Nor the 6-9am commuting period defined by WA State CTR law...







SEA Airport Employee Transportation Program: SEA MOVES

New Comprehensive Communication, Outreach, and Program Administration Services



Website, phone number, newsletters, outreach, consultation, tabling, resource fairs, new employee onboarding, etc. New Airport Employee Transit Pass Pilot Program



Airport authority can play role in card distribution and program administration, but not funding.

> **New Active Transportation** Familiarization Program

Separate from any proposed capital improvements (new bike paths, new storage locations, etc.)

Carpool Incentive Program

Access to main terminal garage for carpoolers

SEA's Existing County Vanpool Parking Incentive Program

\$50/year to park in main terminal garage for registered vanpools

Port of Seattle Funding

Revenue generated by the Port goes into one of three funds.



The Airport Fund

- All money generated at the airport goes into this fund.
- Includes both aeronautical and non-aeronautical revenue.
- Money in this fund can only be spent on airport-related purposes.

The General Fund

- All non-airport money goes into this fund.
- Includes revenue generated from maritime and economic development divisions (moorage fees, cruise ships, etc.)

The Tax Levy Fund



- All money from the Port's property tax levy goes into this fund.
- Money in this fund supports specific things (SKCCIF, sound insulation, Port Jobs, etc.)







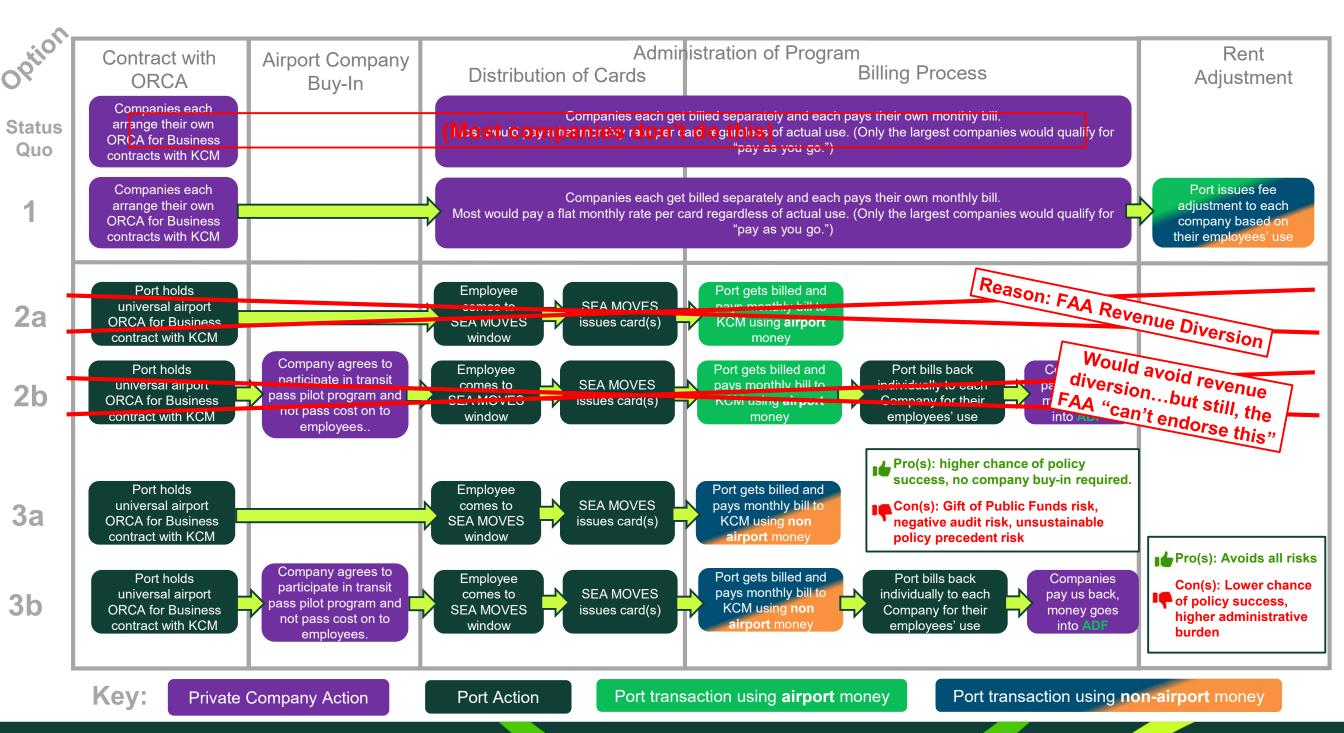














SEA MOVES' New Airport Employee Carpool Pilot Program

Main Points

- Employees use their own personal vehicles.
- Based in Main Terminal Garage.
- Airport-issued badges used for verification.



- If multiple badges are scanned, a parking validation is printed.
- Only for daily parkers (i.e. folks coming to airport for a shift and then going home).
 Validation must be used within 24 hours of issuance.
